COMMODORE'S REPORT

This report is being written in beautiful Balnarring Beach (home) during yet another period of lockdown in Victoria. I do hope, however, that by the time you actually receive this edition of the Mudpuddler, we are back in action at Albert Sailing Club and the country is getting closer to those important vaccination numbers that might see us stay open for the longer term.

Whilst the lockdowns have obviously curtailed our face-to-face sailing and social activities, rest assured that ASC remains in a secure financial position for the future and our committee continues to meet and plan so that we can re-commence activities as soon as permitted. My ongoing thanks go to Rod Thomas for monitoring the ever-changing COVID-19 situation and its implications for the club and to all committee members for their perseverance during these difficult times.

Annual Membership Fees

The August meeting of the committee considered the level of membership fees for the new membership year, which will commence on 1 October. The committee agreed to a minimal increase in both membership and racking fees to cover increases in expenditure and to ensure that our longer-term budget remains solid. For current members renewing for 2021/22, a 15% reduction in fees will then be applied to the membership component of fees (not racking), in recognition of the continuing lack of access for members to the club as a result of the pandemic. An option to 'donate back' the discounted fees will again be made available for those club members who are in a financial position to assist the club in this manner.

In making this decision, the committee was not only cognizant of the impact of the pandemic on club members, but also of the ongoing potential financial impact of repeated closures on our overall financial position. The level of relief offered by external suppliers in 2020 in relation to some areas of our expenditure has not extended to 2021, and hence the committee took a conservative approach to the level of discount it could offer to members.

The committee remains determined and devoted to ensuring that our club comes through these difficult times in a strong and sustainable financial position, and we believe our solid, underpinning financial reserves means that there are many positive and exciting opportunities for ASC in the future. However, there is no doubt that we will continue to face challenges until the pandemic is under control, and we seek your ongoing support for our club through the prompt payment of your membership dues when they issue late in September.

Activity at the Club

We saw some good sailing numbers during the period we were open and, whilst COVID-19 has periodically curtailed activities, it appears that it is also leading people to seek more 'local' sporting options, as enquiries to the club from potential new members remain at a good level. The club also saw good participation by juniors in the Sunday training programs during our open period, and it was a real pleasure to see the club buzzing with juniors, their parents and instructors on those Sundays.

Regatta

Our annual regatta was scheduled for the weekend of June 26 and 27 but was cancelled given that we were all just out of a lockdown period and ongoing restrictions would have made conduct of the regatta difficult. We then rescheduled for July 17 with plans for a one-day 'pop-up' regatta. Again, another COVID-19 lockdown saw the cancellation of that regatta as well. There are no plans to reschedule for another date given the forthcoming opening of the sailing season for bay clubs and consequent difficulty in finding an appropriate date.

From the committee's perspective, the cancellation of the regatta for yet another year was a real heartbreak, as this is the third year in a row that we have been prevented from holding our regatta (last year: COVID-19 Previous year: low water level). And this year we were heading, I believe, for a great regatta. Water levels remained at a high level, we had considerable interest from sailors from other clubs, our club rooms looked terrific (thanks to all who participated in the working bee), and we had a full roster of volunteers (thanks to all who put their hands up to assist on the day). So let's hope the enthusiasm remains and 2022 sees our best-ever regatta.

Women's and Girls in Sailing

In coming months some Women's and Girls sailing and social activities are to be planned following on from the successful Virgo sail and get together in April. This includes an offer from Faye McKenzie to take some training sessions. Keep an eye on Snippets for details after we reopen.

Looking forward

<u>Planning</u>

As we look to the future, Greg Ryan (committee member) is leading a program of planning for the club with a dedicated small group of committee members. This will be done through development of a strategic roadmap for the next few years and will take into consideration the views of all ASC members, Including our youth, female, family and senior sailors. There is further information in this newsletter and I encourage you all to participate in this process and help develop the club for the benefit of all.

Social Sailing and Social Activities

With ongoing uncertainty surrounding the level of Covid-19 related restrictions at any point of time, the Committee has decided that this year's Discover Sailing Day, traditionally held in October, will not be held this year. Instead, we will be focusing our attention on our regular racing program and additional social and mid-week sailing activities so that our existing members can maximise their activity at the club in the company of like-minded club members. Further information can be found in this newsletter.

Social functions will also commence once Covid-19 restrictions allow, with a resumption of our Friday Evening Social Sails and BBQ on the deck once daylight saving starts. Plans for our annual Trivia Night are also underway, although a date for this popular event has not yet been confirmed at this stage.

<u>Club Facilities</u>

The committee has approved the replacement of the deck at the club with a view to having this work completed prior to the summer sailing season. We also plan to create a 'café corner' looking toward the decking area with the purchase of some casual lounge seating and coffee tables.

An expenditure of club funds has been approved to have plans for a lift and all-abilities toilets / changerooms further investigated and developed. These works have been 'in the pipeline' for a number of years and with both state and federal elections coming up in 2022, the club wants to be in a good position to apply for any available funding that will assist us in installing these much-needed facilities.

150 Years of Sailing on the Lake

This year sees 150 years of dinghy sailing on Albert Park Lake and also sees APYC celebrating 150 years as the oldest continually operating inland yacht club in Australia. An invitation (see later in this edition) has been issued to all ASC members to join in the festivities. There will be more details available as the date approaches.

I'm looking forward to seeing everyone back at the club as soon as possible. In the meantime, stay safe and well and may you all see blue skies and fair winds.

ASC is promoting mid-week sailing by forming a network of members interested in casual sailing during the week, outside the normal Saturday schedule. Generally, midweek sailing on Wednesdays, late morning or afternoon, when the weather is reasonable. Can be another day or time.

They tirelessly maintain the impetus of keeping our great club operational, in what is a difficult time with the COVID-19 problem that just won't go away. And my thanks to Paul for nominating for another year as Club Captain. He can often be seen around the club quietly going about the duties of Club Captain, going above and beyond his role, and making the Rear Commodore's task a lot easier. Not forgetting the others who help keep sailing and racing happening each week. The on again off again nature due to lockdown makes the rostering of duty crews more difficult and full credit to Ron Lackington for making it happen. Then there's Steve Lincoln, and the ladies in the tower, Leslie, Sue, and Brenda taking times and assisting with producing results. The members who perform duty, it just can't happen without your efforts, a big thank you to all concerned.

Winter Series progress for 2021

With the Winter Series now completed, this year like last has seen six cancelled races, with only five Winter Championship Races completed out of a possible eight, and four Winter Handicap races out of a possible seven. Unfortunately, at least the first 2 races of the annual 3 race Bill Hooper series in September has been cancelled, as was our Annual Regatta in June, due to COVID-19 restrictions and uncertainty.

New Zest Rudders

During lockdown periods I have made up shorter length timber rudder blades for the 4 new RS Zests delivered in January. Obtaining suitable timber is not as straight forward as a trip to Bunnings. Timber

being in short supply at the moment aside, these rudders were built using Sapele timber sourced from Mathews Timber in Knox. Sapele is a beautiful timber similar to Mahogany, and although a bit on the heavier side it's extremely durable and ideal for the rudder blades, and came in 1kg lighter than the standard Zest rudder! Mahogany being no longer readily available, it was an ideal alternative. A friendly family run business, Mathews have an amazing stock of exotic timber and it is a joy to take a look out back at the amazing array of wood species that they have in stock.



Four new Zest rudders ready for action (above). Note, one was stained to hide a "manufacturing defect". The rounded lower edge was purely a weight saving strategy, although I did see an online article describing it as a go fast measure, most likely on our lake the advantage will be that it will slip through the weed better!

CLUB CAPTAIN'S UPDATE

Here we are again moving in and out of lockdown. The lake is full and probably in the best condition we have seen for years. Hopefully when we do get back, we will still be able to enjoy high water levels and weed free sailing, fingers crossed.

Lockdown homework

It's a great opportunity to brush up on the Racing Rules of Sailing available online at <u>https://</u><u>www.sailing.org/documents/racingrules/index.php</u> and the club's Notice of Race and Sailing Instructions available under Sailing - Race Documents tab of <u>www.albertsc.org.au</u>.

We are also always seeking additional members with a power boat licence to operate our rescue boats so this is a good time to do the work required to obtain you licence. You study up on the, "Recreational Boating Safety Handbook" available at <u>https://</u> <u>transportsafety.vic.gov.au/maritime-safety/</u> <u>recreational-boating/licensing/how-to-get-your-</u> <u>marine-licence</u>, and then book a powerboat licence test as per the instructions on the same website. It's good to brush up on the rules if already a powerboat driver and essential reading if you're planning to get a power boat licence.

When we get back to sailing

Maintenance and operation of our powerboat 'ducks' is important. We currently have three Ducks, (RHIB's). In order oldest to newest, Lake Yellow, Lake Grey, (sometimes called lake White) and Rescue One, (also known as Lake Red.) Some tips on use of the ASC RHIB's

- Check fuel level, attach kill switch and check inflation of RHIB tubes at the start of the day. Each Duck each has their own inflation pumps which are not interchangeable. These can generally be found in the storeroom or on the platform above the Duck storage area.
- Ensure the motor is up and bungs are in prior to launching.
- The two newer Ducks have fuel injection which should make them easy to start with a pull of the starter cord. The older yellow duck needs choke out for first start of day then one or a few pulls of the starter cord.

RS QUEST SAILING IN SPRING

Albert Sailing Club took possession of a 4.3 metre RS Quest sailboat in 2018. The RS Quest boat is a roomy boat with mainsail, jib and asymmetric spinnaker which is ideal for sailing by 2 to 4 people, with a reasonably experienced skipper. We are planning to have the club's Quest out sailing fortnightly in the Spring, subject to Government COVID restrictions.

The club will have a list of experienced members accredited to skipper the Quest. The accredited skipper will take responsibility for the use of the boat and for up to 2 crew who can be at any level of sailing experience and of age 5 years to veteran. Contact Steve Dunn if you are a member interested in being on the Quest skipper list.

The first date programmed for RS Quest sailing is the Social Sailing Day Sunday 26 September. The plan is to have one hour slots from 11am to 3pm, for up to 2 crew per timeslot. Four other RS Quest sailing days have been programmed on Saturdays corresponding to a Club Handicap Series sailing days, with a morning casual sail session and an afternoon

session which may include sailing the club race. There will be 8 available sessions on Saturdays 9th and 23rd October, 14th November, and 4th December. The booking would be for one ASC member; two ASC members; an ASC member & partner or family member.

The dates and booking link for Quest crewing will be notified through our weekly Thursday Snippets. Sessions may be cancelled or added to according to

weather forecasts and announcements on COVID-19 restrictions.



WINTER COACHING PROGRAMS AT ASC

Albert Park Lake was busy with sailing on Sunday afternoons in the mid May to late June period when the Victorian Optimist junior sailors and their families descended on Albert Sailing Club for the Victorian Class Association (VIODA) Term 2 winter coaching program. Thirty five juniors in age range 8 to 13 years of age signed on for the program from a spread of clubs within 80 kilometres or so of Melbourne including: Sorrento, Mornington, Somers, Geelong, Indented Head, Sandringham, Brighton, Black Rock and Mordialloc. From Albert Sailing Club there was Nigel and Tristan in their own boats and James and Max in Optimists leased from ASC, together with the two daughters of the VIODA President Christian Cantwell who belong to multiple clubs, including ASC since May.

The on water coaching for the VIODA program was in three groupings (Open, Intermediate, Green Fleet) based on experience level, with the focus on skill development and having fun. The coaching was provided by a group of ex-Opti sailors, now in their 20's, professionally coordinated by Dave White, the training manager at Sorrento SCBC, who was the 2020 Australian Sailing Victorian Sport Professional Award winner.

A Term 3 VIODA coaching program of 8 Sunday afternoons was also programmed from ASC, with again 35 enrolments. Unfortunately, only week 3 on 1st August was able to be sailed due to the Victorian COVID-19 lockdowns. We trust that the Optimist sailors and their families are able to return to sailing in the Spring months. In the main they will return to their home clubs but will be welcome to sail with us on the Lake as visitors, temporary members or annual members. Albert Sailing Club also hosted a couple of Victorian Laser Association short coaching programs in the Winter months. There was a four day VLA program in early July for Laser 4.7 and Radial sailors with the Thursday and Friday at Albert Sailing Club and the weekend at Sandringham. On the 1st of August there was the first of 4 scheduled Sunday morning sessions for sailors transitioning into the Laser class, mainly juniors from the Optimist class sailing Lasers with 4.7 rigs hired from the Laser Association. We had three ASC juniors in Any, Nick and Mietta in this program. Again COVID-19 restrictions intervened and as at the end of August two of the 4 sessions had been cancelled with the fourth likely to be cancelled or postponed.



During the winter months Albert Sailing Club and Albert Park Lake has again shown that it is an ideal venue for class association training programs and more generally dinghy sailing. We look forward to class association members sailing in future coaching programs and club sailing races and activities at ASC.



GOLDEN YEAR FOR LASER CLASS

2021 has been a golden year for the Laser class being 50 year since the birth of the world's most popular single-handed dinghy, and Australian Matt Wearn's gold medal in the Men's Laser competition at the Tokyo Olympics.

Laser Beginnings

The Laser story began in 1970 when Bruce Kirby, employed by a sailing magazine in Canada, was asked whether he could design a cartopper sailboat. He 'doodled' a sketch of a boat while on the phone which he then put into industrial design drawings. Later that year the magazine's advertising manager had the idea for a regatta for new sail boats with monohulls priced below \$1,000 and multihulls under \$1,200. Bruce had a friend produce a prototype of the 'cartopper', while a University student suggested naming it a Laser and using the distinctive red laser symbol. The Laser was launched at the New York Boat Show in January 1971 with 144 boats sold off the stand. Fifty years later there have been around 220,000 Lasers with 3 different sized rigs, and sailed in over 140 countries.

In 2019 the Laser was renamed the ILCA after a copyright dispute with a European based manufacturer of the class The naming of the boats is in transition with ILCA's, ILCA Lasers being used, but most still referring to them as Lasers. The three rigs are being renamed with Laser standard to ILCA 7, Laser Radial to ILCA 5, and Laser 4.7 to ILCA 4. In July 2021 the designer of the Laser Bruce Kirby died at 92 years of age.


Sydney Celebrations in June

The Laser ILCA Dinghy 50th Anniversary was celebrated on Sydney Harbour on Sunday 20 June. Over 100 Laser sailors braved the winter morning to sail down the harbour from the Sydney Opera House to Watsons Bay. Brett Beyer, 13-times World Laser Masters Champion, led the fleet sailing a one-off gold-coloured boat. A number of Victorian Laser sailors did the anniversary sail including Frant Bucek from Royal Geelong who sailed the oldest boat in the fleet in his 1973 Canadian-built Laser 9953.

Laser Gold at the Tokyo Olympics

Matt Wearn who grew up sailing in Perth, won gold in the Men's Laser event at the 2021 Tokyo Olympics at Enoshima Harbour. This was a decisive win, with Matt only needing to finish the final medal race to take out the gold. It was a memorable performance, particularly as he had not sailed a regatta against an international fleet since the World Laser

Championships at Sandringham in February 2020, due to the COVID situation in Europe and America. This was the third successive Australian Olympics gold in the Lasers, with Tom Slingsby in London on 2012, Tom Burton in Rio in 2016, and now Matt Wearn in 20201.

Women's Laser Radials at the Olympics

The gold medal for the Women's Laser Radials at Tokyo 2020 was won by Anne-Marie Rindom from Denmark. In February 2020, she sailed with around 30 International female sailors from overseas against Australia's best Laser women in the World Laser Radial World Championships at Melbourne's Sandringham Yacht Club. At the conclusion of the 2020 Worlds Anne-Marie gifted her sailing bib to a young Victorian Optimist sailor Lottie Griffith. Lottie sailed at ASC in the winter season in the VIODA winter coaching program. She closely followed Anne-Marie Rindom's progress at the Olympics and after Lottie posted congratulations on Anne-Marie's

Facebook she was excited to receive an email with a personalised video clip from Anne-Marie with the Olympic gold medal around her neck.

WHAT SHOULD THE CLUB LOOK LIKE IN THE FUTURE?

As outlined in a recent email to club members from Cindy, the ASC is currently undertaking a review of our long-term direction. We are looking to set the club up for long term success and sustainability as we come out of COVID-19. This longer-term plan will also assist in working with Parks Victoria to transition from a short-term lease arrangement to a long-term lease, and in making major investments in things such as a lift for disabled access.

We were hoping to be able to do a fair amount of the consultation for the longer-term planning through in person meetings. However, COVID-19 has made that unlikely in the next little while. To keep things moving

we are proposing two things – a brief 5-minute survey to gain your initial views on things you love about the club, things that your think could do with a refresh and things we could do that aren't currently being addressed. Parks Victoria currently have a contractor undertake two harvests per year of aquatic weed from Albert Park Lake. This is generally undertaken in February and November, with this year's February cut was moved to June. Prior to each cut the sailing and rowing clubs are asked to provide details of areas for priority cutting which are taken into account in planning which areas are to be cut.

The Parks Victoria report for the June cut showed: Harvesting Days : 22 days

Volume of vegetation removed : 850 cubic metres 26 hectares covered, with 20% of Lake area harvested

Main areas were: southern Powerhouse basin; Lake "Narrows; middle 2/3rds of the basin west of Gunn Island; strip out 50 metres or so out from sailing clubs promenade and some small areas in northern basin. Rod Thomas

The next cut is for November 2021. Albert Sailing Club will seek priority cutting in the whole northern basin from the promenade in front of the sailing clubs across to the eastern Lake wall and the areas around Gunn Island.

ASC COVID-19 SAFE UPDATE

Since mid 2020 we have had an Albert Sailing Club COVID-19 Safe Plan, with guidelines which are updated as Government regulations change. The guidelines are based on a combination of the latest Victorian Government COVID-19 Safe restrictions, guidelines provided for community sport provided by Sport and Recreation Victoria, and specific guidance for sailing club activities provided by Australian Sailing.

In May 2021 we were successful in applying for a \$2000 Victorian Government Sporting Clubs COVID-19 Recovery grants for hygiene and cleaning equipment and supplies. The grant monies have been used to install new hand dryers and soap dispensers in our Men's and Women's bathrooms, purchase of two sanitiser stands and cleaning and sanitiser supplies which should last us into 2022.

During Government lockdown periods all Albert Sailing Club activities are suspended with no access to the clubrooms and boatyard permitted.

When lockdown restrictions allow access to the club and its facilities members and visitors need to access and follow the current Albert Sailing Club COVID-19 Safe guidelines on the Home of our club website <u>www.albertsc.org.au</u>

Key points include:

- For each visit to club everyone to be signed in on smart phone using the QR Code on entry doors. Where no smartphone enter details on the form on desk in foyer.
- Observe current inside and outside gathering limits and signs on Maximum numbers per inside area usually based on 1 per 4 square metres.
- Wear face masks in accordance with latest Government regulations, usually except when eating or drinking or physical exertion.
- Clean and disinfect equipment and surfaces used on a shared basis.
- Don't come to the club if feeling unwell with possible COVID-19 symptoms or awaiting COVID-19 test results.
- Inform Club Commodore via <u>commodore@albertsc.org.au</u> if you return a positive COVID-19 test in days after attending the club or where at a Tier 1 or 2 site in the days immediately before attending the club.

BEHIND THE SCENES - AUGUST 2021

ESSENTIAL SERVICES AND GENERAL MAINTENANCE

Though the club is closed for the moment there are many areas that get addressed by a number of our keen volunteers. These included scheduled Essential Service inspection and audits, which cover the regular audit of our safety equipment by qualified inspectors. All fire related equipment - extinguishers, hoses and smoke detectors - get inspected on a six monthly basis and building exits etc get an inspection yearly.

In addition, we have a regular program of maintenance of the building and race related equipment, including areas such as outboard motor maintenance, infrastructure (e.g. toilet leaks), anchor, chains, the boat lifter etc., and ongoing and regular minor repairs and maintenance of our fleet of club boats. HOW YOUR SAIL WORKS (PERHAPS)

The theory behind how a sail works can be overwhelming for new sailors. I will attempt in this to simplify it and explain what is happening because you can't see air.

Your sail has a variety of parts that affect the performance. The luff or front edge, the leech on the back edge, the foot or bottom edge, the tack (bottom front corner), the head at the top, the clew at the outhaul and an eyelet a little way up the luff (Cunningham eye). Aside from the mainsheet there is the vang to control twist or tighten the leech, the Cunningham to move the draft forward and the outhaul to reduce the fullness in the lower part of the sail.

The sail has a curve from luff to leach this is called |the draft. This is necessary because the sail needs the air around it to travel at different speeds.

A sail performs in the same way as an aircraft wing. The air travelling further across the back to cause lower pressure and movement in that direction. The center board interferes with that movement and because of it's position in relationship to the body of the sail moves the boat forward.

You can not sail directly upwind because you need the wind to go around the sail so have to sail at an angle to the wind.

The draft affects the efficiency of a sail, too full and the wind will not follow the curve and cause turbulence that slows you down, to flat and the sail cannot generate enough lift limiting the power.


The controls we have allow the adjustment of the draft by use of the outhaul in the lower part of the sail, the Cunningham allows us to shift the draft forward reducing the amount of power in the sail. To maintain most of the sailing working requires the tightening of the vang to keep the sail shape to develop drive.

To monitor what is happening sails usually have tuffs made of some light material at the point of maximum draft at ³/₄ and ¹/₂ height up the sail also at the leech also at ¹/₂ and ³/₄ height. These tuffs show how the air is flowing across and off the sail.

The central tuffs should be flowing back along the sail and the leech tuffs should flow out behind the sail. This is for going to windward and for reaching. Downwind requires only projected sail area. The inbuilt shape of a sail is of no use. The greater area you can present to the wind the more power you have.

One thing to remember is over sheeting or having a sail pulled in too tight is not the best, only sheet the sail sufficient for it to drive you in the direction you want to go. A way of checking if you have sheeted correctly is to ease it slightly, it should start to luff. If your sail twists too far forward sailing downwind the boat will become unstable.

Usually sails have battens either across their full width or at the leach to support the back edge of the sail.



CLASSES SAILED AT OUR CLUB

A variety of mono hull sailing dinghies are sailed at ASC. Multi hulled catamarans and sailboards are not permitted by Park rules.

The classes vary in terms of difficulty, performance and the ideal skipper's weight. Most are made of fiberglass which tend to be lower in maintenance. There are still (mainly older) timber boats for some classes (Sabre, Pacer. Mirror, Heron and Minnow)

The most popular classes sailed at ASC are:

Single handed boats

RS Aero **ÖerO**

Length 4.0 M. The Aero is a modern one design fiberglass boat. Easily rigged and weighing only 30kg it's easily handled on land with high performance on water. With 3 rig sizes it caters for a wide variety of skipper weights of an intermediate skill level.

Laser (ILCA)



Length 4.2M, Fiberglass boat which is the most popular class worldwide. Weighing 58kg it is a challenging class and with no wire mast stays, it is quickly and easily rigged. Three different sail size options – Full rig, Radial and 4.7. Can be sailed by people with differing levels of skills, particularly on inland waters.

<u>Impulse</u>

length 4.0M, Single hander in timber or fiberglass with a hull weight of 47kg A popular class for adults and considered a challenging but fun "intermediate" class.

<u>Sabre</u>

Length 3.76M Single hander in fiberglass and timber with a hull weight of 41kg it is a popular Australian Class of boat. It is ideal for light to medium weight skippers Caters for a wide range of skipper ability levels from novice up to the highly skilled.

Double handed boats



Length 3.3M fiberglass or timber International class, 45kg two person dinghy. Thousands built since inception in 1962. Can be car topped or trailered. Very recognizable by red sails and pram bow. An ideal family boat.

<u>Heron</u>

Length 3.4M timber or fiberglass similar to the Mirror but with a 'pointy' bow and swing centerboard. Weighs in at a heavier 66kgs. Also a good family boat.

Junior boats



Length 2.36M and weight 35kg. Fiberglass class of boat which is the most popular junior class by far in Australia and throughout the world. A great entry level class, with big fleets sailed at levels everywhere.

<u>Minnow</u>

Length 2.13M timber or fiberglass with distinctive blue coloured sail. At one stage the most popular junior class in Victoria but still sailed regularly, Weighing in at 20 - 25 kg's another good entry level junior class.

<u>Open Skiff (ex – Open Bic)</u> 🖸

A fun and improvement -focused one design junior class, which is also sailed competitively. Shallow self-draining hull. Length 2.75 meters. Weight 45kg. For juniors 8 to 14 years of age who have some sailing experience.

ASC RS Zest training boats

ASC has a fleet of 8 modern design RS Zest which can be sailed 1up or 2up. When not in use in training programs Zests are available for rental or short term lease by members.
