COMMODORE'S REPORT

Hi everyone, it has been a good start to 2024. There has since been some interesting weather for sailing with often very light winds, at times shifting through more than 180 degrees.

We have seen water levels dropping rapidly over the first few months of the year, reaching near minimum levels for sailing just around the Grand Prix time. February and March were the driest on record in Victoria. We will continue to keep an eye on trends and work with Parks Victoria to look at options to mitigate low water levels. However, the last few weeks have provided good rainfall and the lake is now almost at full capacity – setting us up nicely for being able to sail through winter and into spring.

CLUB MEMBERS AT CLASS CHAMPIONSHIP EVENTS

The club had 3 members sail at World class championships across January and February.

• Our most experienced junior **Hamish Gilsenan** graduated to the big rig ILCA7 (Laser) class in the latter half of 2023. He sailed the ILCA7 Australian and 1 of 12 Australians who sailed World ILCA7 championships in Adelaide in January. The competition was hot with big fleets of Australian and overseas Olympic sailors including Matt Wearn Australia's ILCA7 gold medallist in Tokyo 2020. The ILCA (Laser) , is the world and Australia's most popular class.

• Jaemie Wilson and David Scammell sailed Jaemie's Fireball in the Australian and World Fireball championships at Royal Geelong Yacht club in February.

Jaemie reported that they started well with a couple of heat results in the low 30s in a strong fleet of 57 boats. After that they had a few breakages a capsize before a start, and a major collision in the second last race where a port tacker failed to give way and another port tacker holed them. Jaemie reported that overall the standard was very high and it was a great experience and opportunity. "The reaches were a highlight getting to 15 knots boat speed regularly with spinnaker up and David extended on trapeze in 25 knots winds and flat water. • **Michael Horvath** who mainly sails from Indented Head and Black Rock Yacht Clubs, but is a longer term ASC member, finished 67th in a strong fleet of 110 boats in the World OK dinghy championships at Royal Queensland Yacht Squadron in late February/ early March.

There were other ASC members who sailed Australian and State class championships:

• **Paul Farrell** finished 10th in the Australian Impulse class championships at Meningie, SA and sailed in Hartley TS16, Pacer Pursuit and Impulse State

championships.

KENGO'S FIRST OPTIMIST STATE CHAMPIONSHIP

The 2024 International Optimist Victorian Championship was held at Sandringham Yacht Club (SYC) over the Labour Day long weekend (9-11 March). About 70 Optimist sailors participated, and 15 sailors came all the way from Sydney and Adelaide. Kengo competed in the Green Fleet, representing Albert Sailing Club. He practised very hard over the summer, and the State Championship was his second regatta to participate following the Buxton Cup at Sorrento in January.

It was an extremely hot and dry weekend, about 35-37 degrees. The winds were over 20 knots on the first day, and all Green Fleet races were cancelled. On the second day, we had 3 races with a moderate and fresh breeze. On the third day, they had 6 races in a lower end of moderate breeze. Kengo came in the 12th position out of 14 boats after the 9 races in total.

The regatta was an excellent opportunity for Kengo to discover what worked well from the hard yards on the lake and what he needs to work on for the next. Kengo demonstrated his skill in beating very well in the first race and went around the top mark in third place. Kengo tasted the first capsize in the sea just before the first race of 3rd day. He managed to get his boat

upright all by himself and bailed water hard to hit the start line. At the end of the regatta, a coach gave Kengo great advice on how to improve his sailing. He needs to master easing out the mainsail and bearing the boat to keep it flat, especially in a gust, so he doesn't have to lose speed.

After the race, Kengo enjoyed ice poles and BBQ. It was great to see him catch up with friends from other clubs who trained together at the lake last winter.

We would like to thank Cindy for being the racing officer for the Green Fleet. And we really appreciate Tony, Gai, Rowley, Rita and Charles for coming to the SYC to cheer Kengo up. Kengo would not have been able to sail in such a strong wind without the support of the Albert Sailing Club. Thank you, Rod, for advising us and running junior training for Kengo during the school holidays.

He took his first Tackers course for a week at Albert Park Lake in 2021 but didn't sail for two years due to the lockdowns. He took Tackers 1 again in early 2023. The last day of the championship in March was his 114th sailing day. Mai and I are very proud of him as Kengo was brave enough to take on strong winds and waves. And he truly loves sailing.

Sometimes you just don't know what you are letting yourself in for. I just wanted a place where I could sail a Sabre, having done a learn to sail course in Mooloolaba a month earlier. After visiting Elwood and Port Melbourne I came to visit ASC. Terry O'Donnell Vice Commodore at ASC, made sure that anyone half interested in membership didn't leave and I was signed up for membership on the spot and approved in January 2004.

There was a much larger fleet of boats, and Impulses were the largest class. It was the Impulse members who convinced me to sail one and lo and behold: we have one for sale! AROUND FRENCH ISLAND - TRACKING THE FAST CATS

The Around French Island (AFI) race is a National sailing event run each year by the Cowes Yacht Club on Phillip Island. It consists of a "simple navigation around French Island in Westernport" (quote: Cowes Yacht Club. See further comments below) and is unique in that it has over \$11,000 in overall prize money. This year's race was conducted on 23rd March tracker can be filtered to show either individual and I was invited to be the Race Official.

The race is restricted to 'fast catamarans' i.e. those with a handicap <83. The fleet is split into 3 divisions, with Division 3 (Hobie 16, Mosquitos etc) starting first, following by Division 2, 5 minutes later (Taipans and Mosquitos with spinnakers), then by the Division 1 boats a further 5 minutes later (F18s, sloop rigged F16, Tornados etc). Whilst the most direct route is 70 km, most competitors travel closer to 100 km whilst navigating around the island. The record for the quickest time is 2 hours 45 minutes with the overall race time limit being 7 hours.

Whilst the race is regarded as a 'simple navigation', Western Port is very tidal and the north-eastern corner of French Island has very restricted navigable waters at low tide. There are also multiple 'exclusion zones' around French Island (pink areas on the attached diagrams), making it tricky for boats, especially those travelling at speed and with sailors hanging out on a trapeze, to successfully avoid those zones. The fleet is therefore led by a lead power boat, but once the fleet has spread out, sailors need to rely on their own knowledge, watch carefully for navigation marks, or hope that the boat in front of them is going the correct way.

To assist in race management, all boats carry a tracker, and all marks of the course and support boats also carry trackers. Once the race is underway, the race management therefore consists primarily of monitoring the electronic tracker system to ensure that:

- Boats will get to the half-way mark on time (3.5 hours), otherwise the race is shortened.
- All boats complete the course correctly.
- No boats are lagging so far behind the fleet that they are unlikely to finish. If this is the case, the race officer can mandate that those boats turn back.

This is an interesting way to monitor a race and, whilst it was highly successful in some aspects, the tracking system presented its own challenges and we needed to make allowance for minor discrepancies between where the tracking system said marks were and where they actually were. On the plus side, the sailors, a selection of sailors, or the entire fleet.



Figure 1 shows the whole fleet as it sailed around the island.

In this diagram, you can see that the majority of the fleet is on the final leg of the course, coming down the western side of the island. However, there are a number of boats well behind the rest of the fleet (circled in red), and the last of these boats had been turned back prior to reaching the half-way point (circled in purple).



Figure 2 shows a close up of one of the exclusion zones (pink area) near the north-eastern turning mark, and it was apparent that a number of boats had entered the exclusion zone. Closer inspection revealed that there was approximately a 50-100 metre discrepancy between the shown position of the mark and the trails left by the boats, although the boats had clearly rounded the mark correctly. Unfortunately, even taking this into account, we disqualified approximately 20% of the fleet for entering an exclusion zone.



Figure 3 shows the first and last finishers in the race (circled in red). The first finisher across the line completed the race in just over 4 ½ hours. Unfortunately, this boat failed to go around the turning mark close to the finish line (which was clearly stated in the sailing instructions), and needed to back-track, round the mark and cross the line again (see more below).

The last finisher completed the course in around 6 3/4 hours but was one of those disqualified for entering the exclusion zone.

Whilst I had no hesitation in making the required disqualifications, my heart went out to those sailors who had spent the better part of the day out racing only to find out after many hours on the water that they hadn't achieved a valid result.

The failure to read the sailing instructions also had very costly consequences for the first finisher, who had travelled from NSW for the event. The boat went from receiving the overall Line Honours Prize and First Prize in Division 1, which would have netted \$3000 in prize money , to being 3rd in Line Honours and 3rd in Division 1, netting \$1050 in prize money. The skipper admitted that she had neither read the sailing instructions nor attended the briefing and had consequently learnt a valuable lesson in the importance of both of those activities.

WHAT WE CAN DO FOR YOU

Albert Sailing Club

Boat Licence Reimbursements

Due to a change in policy, the club will now reimburse the full cost you incur in obtaining or renewing your boat licence, including:

- Costs of doing the course
- Cost of your licence or licence renewal, including full reimbursement for a 5 year licence.

If you are one of the club members who has only had the first 2 years of your 5 year licence reimbursed, please submit a copy of your original licence payment and a copy of your licence to the ASC Treasurer (treasurer@albertsc.org.au) and we will now reimburse the remaining 3 years of your licence payment.

WHAT YOU CAN DO FOR US

The Club has registered to receive donations via the <u>**Container Deposit Scheme**</u>. Club members can either bring their containers to the club, or deposit them locally and request that the proceeds be directed to the ASC account.

Bring Your Containers to the Club

Collection containers are located downstairs near the sign-in area or upstairs near the deck doors (white plastic tub). Simply tip your containers into either of the tubs. Containers must bear the scheme logo (10c) and cans must not be crushed.

Albert Sailing Club

Collection points differ in type, but whatever the type, you will need to direct the proceeds to go to ASC using the following:

Registered name: Albert Sailing Club Inc.

Registered Number and Bar-Code: for scanning machines at collection points.

Albert Sailing Club

Do you have a Parks Victoria Parking Permit that needs renewing or do you visit the club a15 times per year or more and don't have one of the Parking Permits?

Yearly and half yearly Sports Club parking permits are available for parking in the Albert Park Reserve from Parks Victoria for all categories of ASC club membership. The current annual fee is \$73.70 with half rate for half year or concession permit.

Details and forms which include details on how to lodge are available on https://www.parks.vic.gov.au/ places-to-see/parks/albert-park/things-to-do/carparking-in-albert-park.

The application requires either a Form stamped with 'Albert Sailing Club', available upstairs at ASC on a club sailing Saturday or the non stamped form with a copy of receipt for current ASC membership. An acceptable receipt can be obtained by logging in with your email address and a password on https:// albertsailingclub.wildapricot.org/ and selecting and printing My Profile. The My Profile should show Active member with Renewal due on 01 Oct 2024. Sports Club Parking Permit Conditions on the reverse side of the application form should be read and followed. A permit is for a specific car and must be displayed on the left side of the car windscreen. Weekday use with a permit is for parking when involved in Albert Sailing Club activities, and hourly parking restrictions do not apply.
